


MONITORING THE FLORENCE ACTION PLAN

Introduction

When Tuscany took over as the Chair of ENCORE in 2003, offering to organise the ENCORE Conference in 2004, it had to face a number of criticisms from the EU Commission. Together with the ENCORE Steering Group, Tuscany worked hard to demonstrate that ENCORE was willing to listen to these critical remarks and to learn from them. During the ENCORE 2004 Conference in Florence, a number of new elements were introduced in the work method of ENCORE.

- I The Conference adopted the Florence Action Plan (FLAP) which contains concrete and measurable commitments;
- II In the FLAP, a Work Programme is outlined for the period until the next ENCORE Conference. This Work Programme has been monitored and the results of the monitoring are contained in the present Report;
- III In between Conferences ENCORE engages in a number of activities that guarantee continuity and visibility.

The Monitoring Report refers to each of the commitments contained in the Florence Action Plan and describes how each action has been implemented. First, the strategy, the priorities and the six areas of work that were specified in the Florence Action Plan are listed. The subsequent Tables show for each of the six areas of work how they were implemented. Each Table also gives an overall assessment of the results that were achieved.

It is our wish and hope that the Monitoring Report of the Florence Action Plan will remain in the history of ENCORE a milestone that marks the progressive improvement of Regional cooperation in Europe on environment and sustainable development policies as a process of governance. Participation, transparency and reporting are essential elements of such cooperation.

At the ENCORE Conference in Florence in April 2004 the following strategy was adopted by the Regions:

- to strengthen the environment and sustainable development throughout Europe by promoting Agenda 21 at a regional level in co-operation with citizens, organisations, enterprises, other governmental levels and other social and economic partners;
- to work in partnership with businesses at a regional level and to involve educational and research institutions in this co-operation in order to acquire new environmental research and knowledge and to implement this in both enterprises and public institutions;
- to co-operate with the European Commission in implementing the 6th Environmental Action Programme and ensure that the practical experience of the Regions in implementing EU law is reflected in the future work of the Community.

ENCORE priorities 2004 - 2006

The Conference agreed to the following priority actions for ENCORE for the period 2004 - 2006:

- Revising of Valencia Charter.
- Organising seminars and other events to communicate innovative and effective policies on sustainable production and consumption and on climate change.
- Making ENCORE a forum for communicating ideas and best practice on other sustainable development issues.
- Organising an annual meeting between ENCORE and the European Commissioner for Environment.
- Cooperating with other EU-wide networks which have an interest in environmental and sustainable development issues.
- Exploring opportunities for cooperating with EU officials in the preparation of policies, plans and indicators on the environment and sustainable development.
- Establishing partnerships between EU Regions and Regions from the Accession Countries to facilitate the implementation of EU environmental law in the new Regions.

Six areas of work were identified:

- I. Contacts with other networks and European institutions
- II. Activities related to the implementation and monitoring of decisions taken by ENCORE.
- III. Revising the Valencia Charter
- IV. Seminars, workshops, (virtual) working groups and research on specific themes.
- V. Activities related to the setting up of partnerships between "old" and "new" Regions.
- VI. Activities related to the preparation of the next Conference.

Contacts with other networks and European institutions

It is important that the experience of the Regions of Europe in implementing environmental and sustainable development legislation and other measures is reflected prominently in policy discussions in the Member States and in the European Union. The Conference welcomes the meeting of ministers from ENCORE Regions led by the Environment Minister of Tuscany Franci with Commissioner Wallström which took place in October 2003. The Conference asked the Steering Group to seek to organise such meetings with the Commissioner each year. There is a number of bodies with an EU-wide mandate which includes environmental and sustainable development matters. The Conference asked the Steering Group to consider co-operation with such bodies if this could lead to benefits for the sustainable development work in the Regions of Europe. Similarly, the Conference supported the idea to have regular exchanges to strengthen relations between ENCORE and the global Network of regional governments for sustainable development (nrg4SD), created at the UN World Summit on Sustainable Development (WSSD) in Johannesburg in 2002, in order to promote participation by ENCORE Regions in international partnerships for sustainable development, the so-called Type 2 outcomes of WSSD. The Regions of Europe should seek dialogue and co-operation with the EU institutions in the preparation of policies, plans and indicators in the field of environment and sustainable development. Implementation and monitoring of ENCORE decisions

The Florence Conference asked the Regions of Europe to contribute actively to the monitoring of activities carried out by the Regions in the fields of IPP and climate change. The Steering Group was asked to determine how monitoring of ENCORE decisions and work in the Regions on chosen themes can be carried out, and to implement monitoring mechanisms which give a good picture of regional activity and performance, without giving the ENCORE Steering Group an unrealistic number of tasks or task complexity. Simple monitoring measures should be created. The Villach Resolution Review was accepted by ENCORE 2004 as an example of such a monitoring mechanism. It will be fine-tuned and further elaborated for future Review processes.
